What do the following words mean? Could you translate these nouns into Serbian?

- 1. Dog, tree, shop, boy, finger, chair, computer, pencil
- 2. Coffee, sugar, tea, ice, freedom, peace, sand, traffic

Compare these two lists of nouns. What is the main difference between these two groups of nouns? Can you count these things?

- 1. The first list of words contains <u>COUNTABLE</u> nouns.
- 2. The second list of words contains <u>UNCOUNTABLE</u> nouns.

So, nouns in English can be divided into: countable and uncountable. What are the basic differences between them?

COUNTABLE nouns can be counted! Brojive imenice mogu da se prebroje. Look at these pictures.



- There are two boys in the picture number 1.
- There are <u>nine pencils</u> in the picture number 2.
- There are two dogs in the picture number 3.
- There are <u>two trees</u> in the picture number 4.

UNCOUNTABLE nouns cannot be counted! Nebrojive imenice ne mogu da se prebroje. Can you count the things in these pictures? - Not really.



Uncountable nouns are often:

- **abstract ideas** (advice, love, freedom, luck, bravery, music, beauty, help, education, information)
- weather words (weather, thunder, lightning, rain, snow, hail, dew)
- made of smaller parts (rice, sugar, salt, sand, flour, dirt, dust, traffic, grass, spaghetti, makeup),
- **some food** (bread, fish, cheese, chocolate, meat, bacon, food, ham),
- liquids and gases (water, milk, wine, oil, coffee, rain, soup, air, smoke, blood, juice, fog),
- materials (wood, glass, paper, gold, silver, ice, steel), types of fabrics (cotton, silk, wool, leather, satin, velvet, denim)

PLURAL FORMS - Oblici imenica u množini

Countable nouns have plural forms. We add –S or -ES to the end to make singular nouns plural.

- There is **a** dog in the park. Have you got **a** dog? *With singular countable nouns use indefinite articles a/an.
- There are **two** dogs in the park. *With plural countable nouns use –S/-ES ending.

Uncountable nouns do not have plural forms! Do not use indefinite articles or numbers with uncountable nouns!

- He doesn't like **coffee**. / I would like **one cup of coffee**, please.
- / Two cups of coffee...



*Ако чујете негде да кажу I would like **a coffee**, а знате да небројива именица кафа не иде уз неодређени члан, то је зато што се мисли на шољу кафе, **а сир of coffee**, само скраћено.

*Ако знате да небројиве именице немају множину, како онда да искажете квантитет? Одговор је – служимо се другим именицама, попут шоље - **сир**. Једна таква именица је и **piece** што би значило комад, парче, (немојте помешати са речју реасе што значи мир), затим табла чоколаде, коцкице шећера итд.

- I use makeup all the time just because I like it. / What are your favorite pieces of makeup?
- I hate **homework**. / For the Christmas holidays the children have **two pieces of homework**.
- I'm looking for **advice** on how to learn English. / I'll give you **tree pieces of advice**.
- This book contains **information** about that subject. / That's **an interesting piece of information**.
- I know you like chocolate so I bought you a bar of chocolate / two bars of chocolate.
- Do you take sugar with your coffee? How many lumps of sugar do you want?

QUESTION WORDS

With *countable* nouns, we use – HOW MANY? (koliko) – for questions, or – TOO MANY (previše).

With uncountable nouns, we use - HOW MUCH? (koliko) - for questions, or - TOO MUCH (previše).

- 1. Q: How many pencils are there in your bag?
- I have got too many pencils.
- 2. Q: How much coffee is safe to drink on a daily basis?
- 3. As with most things, <u>too much</u> coffee is bad for your health.
- 4. You are not allowed to wear too much makeup in school!
